






The York School



Community Environment: Campus as Part of City

Founded in 1965 by Barbara Goodwin-Zeibots, The York School is a not-for-profit, coeducational, independent, fully accredited International Baccalaureate school with two campuses in a high-density urban neighbourhood of Toronto. In 1987, The York School purchased an existing office building at 1320 Yonge Street and converted it into a school for students from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12. Since 2010, when The York School purchased another existing office building at 1639 Yonge Street, the student body has been divided between the two properties. The Junior School (1639 Yonge Street), houses students from JK to Grade 5, while the Middle and Senior School (maintaining its current design at 1320 Yonge Street), is now home to students from Grade 6 to Grade 12.

Community Environment: Continued...

Montgomery Sisam Architects was engaged to complete phased alterations and additions to both buildings, in order to update the facilities to meet The York School's standards of excellence. The newly developed Junior School provides students with more green space to learn and play, as well as develop stronger connections within their community. The new gymnasium in the Junior School acts as a shared space for social and sporting events for students, staff, parents and community members at large. Designs for a renewed senior school are currently in the planning stages.

Both Junior and Senior Schools create a strong campus presence on Yonge Street, north and south of St. Clair. Restaurants and cafés in the surrounding area provide alternative spaces for students and faculty to meet and discuss school-related projects. Students also engage with local senior centres and churches in social and charitable events, further enhancing their educational experience outside the school boundaries. The renovated building serves a dual purpose to promote a means of higher education in an engaging space, as well as to allow students to foster unique relationships inside and outside of the classroom.



Learning Environment: Spaces in Between

A new Junior School has allowed The York School to offer high quality education in a state-of-the-art building, further raising the school's standards of excellence.

Alterations to the 1639 Yonge St. location provide break-out space in hallways and corridors with large windows to provide a variety of unique views, natural light and fresh air. Innovative planning has allowed the non-programmed space of the building to dramatically increase in the amount and quality of educational space.

The design reflects a desired learning program, and supports a variety of learning styles and methods for delivering instruction. A "School Living Room" with a fireplace provides an informal gathering space for parents, teachers and students. The Library acts as a 'Learning Commons', complete with sliding doors to provide easy access to the Living Room. The new Dining Hall, with massive windows over green space, doubles as an events space for students and community members.





Learning Environment: *Continued...*

All classrooms are equipped with sinks for multi-use teaching, and have windows to allow natural light, interesting views, and fresh air.

Classrooms from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 4 gather around a central hall, which functions as place to robe. It also serves as an informal teaching area and indoor play space during inclement weather.

The outdoor play area has multiple stations for enhanced learning opportunities, which further supports a "learning anytime, anywhere" philosophy.






Physical Environment: *Re-Use Recycle*

The York School's Junior and Senior campuses were designed with an environmentally-conscious approach to support healthy, transformative spaces for learning. The space in both buildings is flexible and adaptable to different methods of instruction.


As an adaptive reuse project,
Montgomery Sisam Architects
repurposed the existing buildings into
bright, contemporary spaces to enrich
the emotional and physical well-being
of students and faculty, while
successfully producing significantly less
construction waste than new
construction.



Physical Environment: Continued...

All casework, including cubbies and lockers, is constructed of Baltic birch plywood, which is highly sustainable. No plastic laminates or adhesives were required to finish the product, and elements of the building were designed to leave no waste. For example, all off-cuts were used to construct the hearth above the fireplace. Both campuses have access to public transit (subway, streetcars and buses). A calm palette of material and colour provides a stress-free environment for students and staff.

Montgomery Sisam ensured that The York School would be a sustainable space, full of light and air, in order to improve students' abilities to think and learn. The redeveloped buildings support this initiative, and are aligned with the School's values to "develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who are engaged citizens of the world."









Planning Process:

Establishing a Master Plan strategy that would allow The York School to grow in the most efficient, fiscally responsible way, while maintaining a high quality of design and strong identity, was of critical importance to this project. By infusing the site with a contemporary look, Montgomery Sisam aimed to appeal to their target demographic.

Design commenced in early June 2009 with the aid of a Construction
Management approach and some creative permitting strategies.
Occupancy was achieved for August 2010, in time for the new school year. The new design provides The York School with a bright and contemporary environment flooded with daylight and a variety of unique views.




